Comments

While the mission detected an overall improvement in project implementation, an objective analysis of all indicators and project factors still gives a Moderately Satisfactory rating for PDO, IP, and all components. Some key aspects of project management and EPF capacity have improved (see next section) and trends in this regard are promising, but for now Component 3 is still rated MS pending further progress in pace and timeliness of implementation, work flow, budget execution, and functional capacity strengthening. Under Components 1 and 2, a number of subprojects have begun gaining more traction and performance of some SDAs has improved, but these gains have been uneven. A few subprojects are still considered at risk and a strategy to closely monitor these have been agreed with the EPF. Relevance of LENS2 is still good, particularly with stronger engagement and ownership by the government generally and EPF and the SDAs specifically, as well as the addition of policy and regulatory subprojects and activities aimed at improving additional aspects of the enabling environment for conservation and environmental management. The planned restructuring will also rebalance component costs to appropriately weight the main components in line with current priorities, and will revise the PDO and results framework to better capture the project activities and objectives and more appropriately, clearly, and realistically measure outputs and outcomes based on detailed discussions with the SDAs about the indicator definitions and targets.

Comments

Some key project management functions have started to improve, particularly for the implementing agency, EPF, which in its subproject evaluation was upgraded to satisfactory for both financial management and M&E. However, the overall rating for the EPF subproject remains MS due mainly to moderate shortcomings in work flow and annual plan / budget execution as well as making less progress than expected in overall strengthening of

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functional capacity. Combined with improvements in the performance of a number of other subprojects and their delivery agencies, LENS2 project management is close to being upgrade to Satisfactory, but for now will remain at MS. As mentioned in the Key Issues section and detailed in the aide-memoire, three targeted, short-term TA consultancies are proposed to address specific project management and work flow areas identified as needing further strengthening.

1.2 KEY ISSUES & PROJECT STATUS

Key issues and Actions for Management Attention

Issues

Issues from Previous ISR:

EPF Decree --- The Decree has been signed and is in effect.

Subprojects with difficulties --- The 3 flagged subprojects are gradually improving. (1) DESIA subproject is under implementation but up to a slow start; (2) the Nakai Nam Theun (NNT) subproject proposal has been cleared by the Technical Committee. Next step is World Bank no-objection. NNT requires to implement the so-called WMPA Action Plan whereby key processes must take place before subproject signing (e.g. selection of a partner, agreement on strategic staffing). Implementing this Action Plan is also a necessary to close the NT2 Project 'safeguard compliant" in December 2017; and (3) the Nam Et Phou Louey subproject proposal has also been cleared by the EPF Technical Committee. Next step is World Bank no-objection. Signing of the LENS2 sub-grant will requires the Minister MAF to sign a Decision to establish the NEPL Management Unit and to improve the Environment and Social Management Plan (ESMP).

New issues from this ISR.

Restructuring and accommodation of evolving priorities --- Following the GoL and WB increased engagement in Green Growth and environment planning, the LENS2 portfolio evolved to support departments involved in environment planning and in pollution control. A key reason was to support the government of Lao in fulfilling its prior actions for the new IDA Green Growth Development Policy Operation. A consequence is that the PDO has

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become too restrictive and new indicators are required. In addition, during the MTR, the WB, EPF, and subproject agencies agreed on a number of improvement in the set of indicators. Improving the PDO and indicators requires project restructuring which the government will request upon receiving the MTR aide-memoire. The RP will also rebalance component costs and reallocate a small amount from the project preparation advance category to the main investment disbursement category. The project implementation manual will be revised as needed once the details of the restructuring are formalized.

Accelerating subproject preparation --- The LENS2 is entering its 3rd year. Several subprojects are still under preparation. If they do not start implementation this fiscal year, they will have difficulties achieving their intended outcomes. Most of these subprojects are in advance preparation and should come on line within 6 months.

Short-term technical advisors --- Three short-term TA consultancies are proposed to help strengthen key areas identified during the MTR that would facilitate more efficient and effective implementation. The advisors will review workflow in safeguards quality support, procurement and general operations, and design standard training packages and deliver trainers training to EPF staff.

Implementation Status and Key Decisions (Public Disclosure)

Progress has been promising, albeit with some delays. Under the project, the Laos Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) finances subprojects aimed at Policy and Capacity Enhancement (PICE) and Community and Biodiversity Interventions (CBI). Of the 23 planned subprojects under the PICE window, 15 are now underway and a number are beginning to show good initial results. These activities include improving the institutional and regulatory framework for protected areas, environmental and natural resources planning, building capacity for wildlife and environmental law enforcement and monitoring, human resources development in key agencies, pollution reduction, environmental research, and impact assessment, among others. The remaining 8 subprojects are expected to be underway by June 2017. Under the CBI window, 8 of 13 planned subprojects are now under implementation: 3 aimed at strengthening provincial wildlife law enforcement and 5 to build provincial capacity for protected areas management. Progress on starting subprojects for management of specific protected areas (PAs) has been slower. At this stage only one PA subproject is under implementation (Phou Chom Voy Conservation Forest), two are expected to start by June 2017 (Nakai Nam Theun and Nam Et Phou Louey), and another seven (for smaller PAs) are at earlier stages of preparation. The project administration role of the EPF, another capacity building focus of the project, is commendable and continues to improve. The project's relevance has been strengthened by the new policy of Lao PDR to embrace green growth as a core development strategy and to strengthen governance and the rule of law in the resources sectors. A proposed project restructuring is under discussion that would realign component costs with current priorities and revise the formal objectives and results indicators to better capture and measure the full range of project activities, objectives and outcomes.

Under the CBI window there are thirteen (13) subprojects, three (3) Provincial Office of Forest Inspection are implementing wildlife law enforcement capacity subprojects and five (5) Provincial Department of Forest Resources Protections are implementing capacity building activities for protected area management. Progress in getting the actual protected areas (PA) management subprojects underway has been slower. At this stage, only one PA subproject is under implementation. It is implemented by the Faculty of Economic and Business in Phou Chom Voy Conservation Forest. Two (2)

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protected area subprojects are at the appraisal stage, and another seven (7) are at some earlier stage in the preparation process. The two largest PA subprojects, for the Nakai Nam Theun (NNT) and Nam Et Phou Louey (NEPL) national protected areas, are not yet underway but are expected to be approved in the first half of 2017. Many of the subprojects that still are not ready for appraisal were added as part of the 2015 additional financing that expanded the number of participating provinces and subprojects.

Under Component 3, EPF administer the project and enhances its capacity. The project administration role of EPF is commendable and improving. EPF has also progressed in its agenda toward restructuring, starting with the approval of the new decree. Past delays were due in part to a government process of redefining some institutional roles and mandates. It temporarily affected implementation progress but is concluded. During the MTR, the Bank and EPF agreed of a set of measures to improve subproject quality, ownership and implementation as well as build capacity of EPF staff and subproject agencies staff through the development of standard training tools.

The March 2017 midterm review concluded that the project performance was already showing signs of implementation. The project relevance has been strengthened by the new policy of Lao PDR to embrace green growth a core development strategy and implement better the rule of law in the resources sectors. A number of adjustment have been discussed with the EPF and subproject agencies. One important adjustment is to broaden the scope of the Project Development Objective to encompass better the country policy priorities for green growth and improve indicators.

The safeguard team is composed of Sybounheung Phandanouvong (Social safeguards); George Henry Stirrett Wood (Environment safeguard with focus on protected areas); Peter William Crawford (Environmental safeguards with a focus on non-protected area subprojects). They have participated in the MTR mission, written part of the Aide Memoire and verified the safeguard ratings. The rating of OP/BP 4.12 is downgraded to MS because of (a) the slow application of the Community Engagement Framework in the first protected area subproject, (b) as compared with the superseded Decree 192 (2005), the new Compensation and Resettlement Decree 84 (2016) has provisions that makes Lao legislation no longer aligned with World Bank safeguard policy on involuntary resettlement (OP4.12), The safeguard team is addressing these issues. Comments

The policy and rule of law environment in Lao is improving. There is a substantial improvement in policies and sector strategies with the adoption of the 8th National Socio Economic Development Plan and the country move toward a greener form of growth. Therefore the risk associated to policies and strategies is lowered from High to Substantial. Other risks such as "Stakeholders" is also likely decreasing and should be lowered to Substantial by the next mission. If the restructuring is completed and the signs described above confirm, the overall risk should also decrease to Substantial. The social risk is considered High and remains High because a significant gaps in some key provisions of requirements between the new Compensation and Resettlement Decree 84 (2016) and the superseded Decree 192 (2005), which was largely consistent with the World Bank safeguard policy on involuntary resettlement (OP4.12). The World Bank safeguard team has engaged discussions on this with MONRE.

It also does not apply to custom and economic police subprojects. The MTR has recommended an alternative indicator that will be proposed in the restructuring paper.

The Score of functional capacity is based on self-assessment of current and desired capacity. The MTR found unrealistic to consider that LENS2 influences overall institutions capacity for most SDAs. It was agreed that the score would be optional for most SDAs but remain mandatory for the institution which receives overwhelming capacity building support from LENS2 which are the EPF, the protected area management units and the university faculties. This will be reflected in the restructuring paper.

The MTR proposed a new indicator: (# of) evidences of environmental planning in the 5-year provincial or sectoral plans influenced by MPI and MONRE subprojects (cumulative). This will be reflected in the restructuring paper.

This indicator used to be a core World Bank indicator. For an area to qualify for "upgrade", the METT score need to jump from a level to another. Most protected area in are in the low-moderate range (between 25 and 40). An upgrade would occur around a score of 60 which is not realistic. Given that this core indicator no longer apply, the MTR proposed to simplify the phrasing of the outcome indicator to simply: (Score of) protected area management effectiveness (cumulative). The outcome target would be revised to be realistically aligned with SDA capacities. This will be reflected in the restructuring paper.

The indicator has already met it send of project target reflecting both success and lack of ambition. The main feedback from past years of implementation about this indicator is that SDAs do not sufficiently understand what means basic adaptive training. Some training actually goes under reported and some training goes over reported. For example, figures reported in past annual results frameworks were over estimated due to double counting as well as half-day (or less) trainings counting. They needed to be adjusted by the MTR. In the future, the MTR suggest to improve the explanation to SDAs on the nature and content of this indicator (e.g. dissociate "formal" training from "basic" training and address double-counting issue.) This will be reflected in the restructuring paper.
