## B. Enabling Activity Summary

### Enabling Activity Objective

To assist GEF-Eligible Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety to prepare and submit their Fifth National Reports on measures that each party has taken to implement the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

### Enabling Activity Summary

Project Goal: The overarching goal is to assist Parties to review and provide an update on the status of implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety in line with obligation of Article 33.

Project Objective: The main objective of this project is to assist GEF-Eligible Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety to prepare their Fifth National Reports on measures that each Party has taken to implement the Protocol in line with Article 33.

Project Component(s): The main project component focuses on supporting the GEF Eligible Parties on preparation of the Fifth National Reports to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

#### Project Outcomes and Outputs:

Outcomes: The Fifth National reports are submitted in line with obligations of Article 33 of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety and COP/MOP Decision on National Reporting.

Outputs: 85 GEF Eligible Parties receive GEF funds and prepare their Fifth National Report on measures taken to implement the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety in line with relevant COP/MOP. Decisions.

Project Activities: At the Party level, the projects will collect data taking into consideration the questions in the reporting format including aspects of gender and gender disaggregated data, in line with the CBDs gender plan of action (2023-2030). The collected data will be utilized to prepare draft national reports which will be subjected to a first national consultative workshop. In parallel, the draft report will also be shared with key national expert groups and relevant stakeholders for inputs. The relevant stakeholders will include government representatives (i.e. national focal points, ministries, and policy makers) indigenous and local communities, research community, business owners, non-governmental organizations and civil society, including the media. The feedback from the workshop and stakeholders will then be incorporated in the first draft report. At the global level, help-desk support aimed at providing technical advice to countries during preparation of their national reports will be made available. In addition, regional workshops will be organized to provide technical support to parties to draft national reports and engage diverse stakeholders as well as promote knowledge exchange through peer-to-peer learning.

Based on feedback received, the national reports will be updated and subjected to the second national consultative workshop for review and validation. The updated report will be submitted to UNEP for technical review. The project interventions will contribute to the Implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety as outlined under Focal Area Programming Direction BD-EA “Further development of biodiversity policy and institutional frameworks through Enabling activities (national biodiversity strategy, national reports for CBD, CP, and NP)”. The results and deliverables shall contribute to Target 17 of the Kunming Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework through the provision of data to support safeguarding biodiversity, managing genetic resources and related benefits, assessing options and planning capacity building interventions to support implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety. The prepared National Reports will also provide primary data to support global assessment and review of the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety in line with Article 35 of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

Each Party will receive a total of USD 30,000 to prepare the 5th National Reports except Libya which will be receiving additional support through this enabling activity to produce in parallel its 4th and 5th national reports.

Such support has been extended to all countries that did not previously benefit from the GEF to produce their 4th national report and have been cautioned by the compliance committee for not having produced it yet.

## STAKEHOLDER IDENTIFICATION

The project will build on the experiences that countries have already gained through the preparation and implementation of the results of the Interim and the last four national biosafety reporting. Guided by the results, the project will put in mechanisms to effectively secure the involvement of national authorities, non-governmental organizations, private sector, research institutions and local communities through the ongoing GEF projects on Development and Implementation of National Biosafety Frameworks and assistance on “Building Capacity for Effective Participation in the BCH” and other related biosafety projects. The project will be carried out through data collection, consultative workshops and interactive meetings at the national level. The various governmental departments serving as Competent National Authorities will be consulted to establish the baseline information necessary in completing the National Report.

### PRIVATE SECTOR ENGAGEMENT:

The Private Sector will be involved in national consultative workshops and contribute data as relevant to activities on modern biotechnology as applicable. The Private Sector working in close collaboration with the Competent National Authorities will contribute to providing data on Party responses and experience in implementation of Article 21 on Confidential Business Information.

### CIVIL SOCIETY:

The Civil society groups will provide support on consumer related issues and interventions on data related to articles 20 (Biosafety clearing house and information sharing) and 21 on public education, awareness and

participation. Civil society will also participate as members of national task forces or advisory groups and take part in the consultative processes and contribution of data.

## Gender equality and women's empowerment

Even though the proposed project is a normative task required to be executed by all Parties to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety as a party obligation, efforts will be put in place to ensure representation of women, youth and men in the consultative process and also gender specific data will be collected and disaggregated even though the reporting formats does not require this information especially in the execution of Article 23 of the Protocol on Public Awareness, Education and Participation. National relevant data to support the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety will be documented to support future and planned capacity building interventions. The data to be captured is envisaged to identify and highlight measures that will facilitate women's participation in decision making and potential areas for generating socio-economic benefits or services for women and the youth.

The [format](#) of the Fifth National Report prompts parties to provide information on what socio-economic considerations arise from the impact of Living Modified Organisms (LMOs) based on article 26.1 of the CPB. This provides an opening for Parties to identify issues for consideration in the biosafety regulatory processes to facilitate decision making. While drafting of the Fifth National Report may not have direct benefits to women and the youth, it is the “off shoot” policies that are developed as a result of this report, that may be of benefit to parties e.g. drafting of regulations that ensure introduction of LMOs does not negatively impact on a countries' population especially women and youth or provide data to guide national processes for enforcement of the national biosafety framework and capturing data that will allow for cost benefit analysis of introduction of LMOs through dedicated *ex ante* and *post ante* socio economic studies.

The proposed project interventions will contribute to the Implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety as outlined under Focal Area Programming Direction BD-EA “Further development of biodiversity policy and institutional frameworks through Enabling activities (national biodiversity strategy, national reports for CBD, CP, and NP)”. The results and deliverables shall contribute to Target 17 of the KMGBF and the Implementation Plan and Capacity Building Plan of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety through the provision of data to

support safeguarding biodiversity, managing genetic resources and related benefits, assessing options and planning capacity building interventions to support implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety. It will also support global assessment and review of the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

## SECTION 2: ENABLING ACTIVITY SUPPORTING INFORMATION

### C. Eligibility Criteria

Please provide eligibility information for this enabling activity.

In context of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety, the national reporting provides an update on the status of implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety and hence facilitate intervention measures under the GEF 8 Biodiversity Focal Area Set Aside support for Enabling Activities. The project is consistent with the GEF 8 Biodiversity focal area strategy under BD-EA “development of biodiversity policy and institutional frameworks through enabling activities (national biodiversity strategy, national reports for CBD, CP, and NP)”. The requested enabling activity support will provide data to support revision of National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAPs) in line with the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, the Implementation Plan and the Capacity Building Action Plan of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (2021-2030) and the national reporting guidance as provided under Decision CP 10/9 with support from the Biodiversity Focal Area Set Aside fund. It will also provide data to support the Global Review and Assessment of implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety and provide lessons, needs and best practices to support the implementation of Target 17 of the Kunming Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework.

Parties are required under Article 33 of the CPB to submit National Reports on the status of implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety every four years as indicated below:

“Monitoring and Reporting - Each Party shall monitor the implementation of its obligations under this Protocol, and shall, at intervals to be determined by the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to this Protocol, report to the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to this Protocol on measures that it has taken to implement the Protocol.”

In order to assist the Parties to meet their obligation under the Protocol in an effective manner, the GEF funding support provided through UNEP assists the eligible Parties by giving the Parties the necessary technical advisory support in data collection, consultations with the relevant stakeholders, interpretation of Protocol related issues and in the compilation, review and submission of the report in the required format <https://www.cbd.int/doc/c/a0f0/8d2d/acc818e3ea947089afa8146c/cp-mop-10-05-en.pdf>

The main criteria for taking part in the project are: -

- 1) Being eligible as a Party to access GEF funding support.
- 2) Submission of a letter of endorsement indicating interest in the proposed project concept. A sample letter of endorsement is attached as ANNEX J.

The letters of endorsement are attached to the project and listed as Annex D. Section H of this project document shows a listing of GEF parties who provided Letters of endorsement as an expression of interest in the GEF funds and commitment to prepare the national reports.

This project is an intervention in alignment with the GEF’s mandate to generate global benefits by paying for the incremental costs of planning and foundational enabling activities that countries implement to generate global biodiversity benefits. The contents of the 5th National Report will greatly assist the CPB, and the countries plan for their biosafety related actions under the KMGBF, the Biosafety Implementation Plan and the Capacity Building Action Plan and the revised NBSAPs. The output of the national reporting process could generate future capacity building interventions and projects as a result. The project delivery will

further be guided by the obligations of Article 38 – the no reservation clause – as a basis to ensuring a high-quality reporting to support the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

#### D. Institutional Framework

Describe the institutional arrangements for implementation of the enabling activity.

For project execution, the following entities will be involved.

(a) The **Eligible parties** are the parties that have ratified the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety and are eligible to receive GEF support. As already emphasized all parties have an obligation under Article 33 of the Protocol to submit their National Reports to the BCH highlighting progress made in implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety. Parties are to submit the reports in the required format by the 28 February 2026. Parties are to collect and analyze national data, hold national consultative meetings with the relevant stakeholders to gather the necessary information for the report and validate the data prior to publication on the BCH.

(b) **Project Management Unit:** The Nature Frameworks Support Unit in UNEP will support and work closely with Parties in the execution of the project and will -

- 1) Review project progress with respect to objectives, strategies and workplans.
- 2) Peer review and provide technical inputs/advice to the draft Fifth National Reports prior to submission for consistency and relevance guided by the required information
- 3) Liaise with the SCBD, the Biosafety Compliance Committee and any other relevant bodies for the benefit of the project.
- 4) Advise on how best to mobilize further resources and identify follow up interventions as applicable; and
- 5) Monitor and ensure the timely and adequate flow of funds.


(c) **UNEP-GEF Biodiversity and Land Degradation Unit:** The Biosafety Programme operating under the UNEP/GEF Biodiversity and Land Degradation Unit under the Ecosystems Division will be responsible for the GEF Implementation Agency role and will ensure that the executing entities implement the project in accordance with the objectives and activities outlined above. It will ensure consistency with GEF and UNEP policies and procedures and will provide guidance on linkages with other related UNEP and GEF-funded activities. UNEP has been closely involved in the GEF Biosafety Programme and assisted parties in the preparation of the Second, Third National and Fourth Reports. It supported the negotiation and entry into force of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety. UNEP provides Secretarial support to three major biodiversity-related Multilateral Environmental Agreements: the CBD, CITES and CMS. UNEP has also provided support for capacity building activities related to the Convention on Biological Diversity. It has assisted more than 35 countries to prepare Biodiversity Country Studies and National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans and, through its Environmental Law Programme, UNEP continues to assist countries to adopt environmental regulations and legislations. UNEP has been recognized for its neutrality in the face of a contentious issue (biotechnology /biosafety /LMO commerce) and is regularly requested to provide direct technical assistance and facilitate multi-stakeholder involvement in biosafety. Over the past decade, UNEP has assisted more than 130 countries to develop national biosafety frameworks and to build national BCH capacity, as well as working with over 80 countries on national, regional and thematic level implementation of these NBFs.

(d) **A Project Steering Committee (PSC)** will be established to provide overall guidance and technical advice on project implementation, institutional coordination and achievement of the project objectives. The Project Steering Committee will comprise representatives from UNEP/GEF Biodiversity and Land Degradation Unit representing the GEF Implementing Agency, the Nature Frameworks Support Unit representing the Executing Agency, the CBD Cartagena Protocol team, relevant branches and units in the Ecosystems Division, the Law Division, and UNEP-WCMC including representatives from the relevant regional offices. The Global Sub-Programme Coordinator for Nature Action and Regional Sub-Programme Coordinators for Nature Action will also be members of the PSC.

The PSC will meet six-monthly to assess progress on the delivery of the agreed project objectives, and outputs and recommend necessary adjustments to the Project. Continuous exchange of information through electronic means will be established from the outset, and steering committee meetings via teleconference or other electronic means can be held as necessary. Reports and recommendations of all PSC meetings will be prepared and disseminated no later than one month after each meeting.

**E. Monitoring and Evaluation Plan**

Describe the budgeted M&E plan.

**Monitoring:** The project will follow the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and Global Environment Facility (GEF) minimum requirements for project monitoring, reporting, evaluation processes and procedures. Substantive and financial project reporting requirements are an integral part of the UNEP legal instrument that will be signed by the National Executing Agency and UNEP.

Day-to-day project management and monitoring will be the responsibility of the National Executing Agency (NEA). The project monitoring will start with the national Inception workshop and the development of a detailed work-plan, budget and detailed monitoring and evaluation plan with key stakeholders.

The NEA will develop and submit to UNEP technical and financial reports every quarter describing the progress according to the work-plan and budget, identifying obstacles that occurred during implementation and the remediation actions to be taken. Substantive and financial project reporting requirements are an integral part of the UNEP legal instrument, the Small-Scale Funding Agreement (SSFA), that will be signed by the National Executing Agencies and UNEP. UNEP will monitor the project progress according to the work-plan on a regular basis and provide guidance to the NEA to progress according to the work-plan. The Enabling Activity does not require a PIR. In lieu of the annual PIR reporting, the project will provide project status data during the annual reporting period in the GEF Portal. Upon completion of the activities, the NEA will prepare an Operational Completion Report and final statement of accounts.

Agreement on intellectual property rights and use of logo on the project's deliverables and disclosure of information: To accord proper acknowledgement to the GEF for providing grant funding, the GEF logo will appear together with the UNEP logo on all promotional materials, other written materials like publications developed by the project, and project hardware. Any citation on publications regarding projects funded by the GEF will also accord proper acknowledgement to the GEF. Information will be disclosed in accordance with relevant policies, notably the UNEP's Disclosure Policy and the GEF policy on public involvement.

**Evaluation:** In line with the GEF Evaluation requirements, and the UNEP Programme Manual and Evaluation Policy, all GEF funded projects are subject to a performance assessment when they reach operational completion. Notably, GEF Enabling Activities are exempt, by both UNEP and the GEF, from any mid-point performance assessment.

In the case of Enabling Activity projects with total funding below USD 1.5 million, OR which are issuing grants of less than USD 1.5 million each to multiple implementing countries, albeit administered through a single GEF ID, an Operational Completion Report meets both the UNEP and the GEF performance assessment requirements.

As the project will be issuing grants of USD 30,000 to each implementing country, an Operational Completion Report will be prepared to meet the GEF performance assessment requirements.

An Operational Completion Report is a form of self-reporting that is led by the Task Manager of the project, and a quality check by the Evaluation Office is not required. The Operational Completion Report template is available from the Policy and Programme Division.
