






Map 2



Subject: Confirmation of WCS co-financing for the CALM Project (PIMS 2177)


With regard to the financing of the proposed Cambodia CALM project which is being submitted for approval of the full phase, I am writing to you to confirm the support of the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS).

WCS is an international non-governmental organization dedicated to wildlife conservation. In Cambodia, WCS works under a MoU with the Royal Government, signed jointly with the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries and the Ministry of Environment. As part of this program WCS has been active in the Northern Plains, the site of the CALM project, since 2000 and was instrumental in successfully implementing the preparatory phase with both local and government partners.


During the preparatory phase of the CALM project WCS provided funding totalling US\$475,000. As part of our continuing commitment, WCS is willing to provide US\$1,000,000 of parallel co-financing and additional in-kind contributions of US\$500,000 over the seven year life of the proposed initiative.

Subject: Confirmation of SEILA Contribution to the Cambodia CALM Project (PIMS 2177)

With regard to the incremental cost provisions of GEF funding, we are writing to you to confirm the Seila financing contribution as parallel funding to the Cambodia CALM Project which is being proposed to access GEF funding for the full phase.

As you may be aware, the SEILA Program is an aid mobilization and coordination framework in support of the Royal Government's decentralization and deconcentration reforms, and its goal is to contribute to poverty alleviation through good governance.

The SEILA program is committing various financial resources to the four provinces (Preah Vihear, Oddor Meanchey, Stung Treng and Siem Reap) of the Northern Plains project. Some of these resources are for unrelated activities or for activities which can be considered baseline to the GEF proposed project. However, considerable resources are being directed to specific activities that are crucial for the success of the CALM project and which are recognized in the project logframe.

The current phase of the Seila Program is due to last until December 2005. The components of this phase which will directly contribute to natural resources management in 2004 of the four provinces is \$122,039 (see the attached table for details). Although SEILA does not specify budget levels for the period beyond the current phase, it is expected that funding will continue and that Natural Resource Management will be a priority. Even if the SEILA contribution remains the same, at a minimum level, over the seven year project period the total contribution is expected to be \$427,136. In reality, the CALM project is expected to motivate a greater contribution than this from SEILA through influencing the ability of the relevant Government agencies to apply for and allocate resources to the natural resource sub-sector, though this cannot now be estimated.




In addition, Siem Reap Province is one of the three target provinces of the SEILA/Danida Environmental Natural Resource Management project. Svay Leur District of Siem Reap Province, which borders Preah Vihear Province of the Northern Plains and which includes part of Kulen Promtep Wildlife Sanctuary, will become a target of the SEILA/Danida ENRM project from 2005 until 2007. Thus, over the two year period, the direct contribution of the Seila/Danida ENRM Pilot Project on this particular district of the northern Plain is expected to be \$40,000.

From the committed budgets of the SEILA program and the operational plans for coming years, it is expected that US\$467,136 will be provided by SEILA for activities directly related to key activities of the CALM project.


