Project linkage to national priorities, action plans and programs:

As all the countries where the project is to be implemented are Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, they are obligated to undertake activities that promote local community involvement in the conservation and sustainable use of biological resources. Specifically relevant Articles in this regard include 8(j), 10(c)(d), 11, 12 and 13. As the project essentially takes the form of a public education and awareness program using local and traditional means of communication to promote incentives for local community participation in implementing the Objectives of the Convention, it is of special relevance to Articles 8(j), 11 and 13.

In this regard, the project is in direct accord with Decisions IV/9 and IV/10(A) and (B) as adopted by the Fourth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the CBD, as well as Decision IV/16 (notably the Programme of Work for the Fifth Meeting). Further to this, all the target countries have adopted policies, plans and programs to engage the active participation of local communities in the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity. In fact, southern Africa is prominent in international conservation fora for its initiatives over the last several years in spearheading Community Based Natural Resource Management (CBNRM) programs through the promotion of

decentralised authority and associated institutional arrangements, including social and economic incentive measures and devolved tenurial rights, for the conservation and sustainable use of natural resources. The Southern African Development Community (SADC) has prioritised CBNRM as an environmental strategy and is implementing a regional Natural Resources Management Programme (SADC-NRMP) now covering all the project's target countries following the recent inclusion of South Africa and Mozambique as a result of political stability in the two countries. The national strategies and action plans being prepared or completed as required in terms of Article 6 of the Convention, include provision to enable local communities to participate effectively in the implementation of the CBD and accordingly, the project fully corresponds with such strategies and plans.

Project contribution to global biodiversity conservation:

The highest rate of deforestation currently taking place in the world is in the semi-arid Savannahs of southern Africa (up to 10% per annum in parts of the region). The human population is increasing at rates exceeding 3% per annum and the requirement for new lands to support agricultural production is the greatest threat to biological diversity in the region. The tragedy of the process is that the newly cleared lands are unable to support sustainable agriculture, and higher valued land uses which rely on the tourism potential of the charismatic megafauna unique to Africa are being foreclosed.

The Convention on Biological Diversity has recognised the urgency of the situation and the Parties have decided to focus on semi-arid savannahs and sustainable use, including tourism, at the next Conference of the Parties in the year 2000. A key topic will be land use outside protected areas and the involvement of local communities in the management of biodiversity.

This project will make a direct contribution to the conservation of biodiversity through:

- raising awareness amongst local communities of the land use alternatives for sustainable development which rely on sustainable use of biological resources;
- communicating experiences and lessons learned, from successful community wildlife management projects in the region, widely amongst other communities in the region;
- stressing both to policy makers and communities throughout the region the key land tenure arrangements, institutional mechanisms and community empowerment procedures necessary for successful conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity.

It is worth noting that the '*Guardians of Eden*' project contributed significantly to a fundamental shift in policy direction at the World Conservation Congress in 1996 causing IUCN and other major conservation organisations to place increased emphasis on the 'human face' of conservation. This was due to the extremely powerful effect of the medium chosen to communicate the message. This new project should provide new conceptual material through its participatory research aspects with local communities and result in a process-based development founded on deeper understanding of the social, cultural and economic factors involved in land use choices in southern Africa.

It is anticipated that this project will build upon and further develop experience gained in other GEF biodiversity conservation initiatives, such as the Lake Malawi / Nyassa Biodiversity Project and the South African Cape Peninsula National Park Project, with which Theatre for Africa has been involved.

PART 11 - INFORMATION ON BLOCK A PDF ACTIVITIES

The overall success of the regional project will require the active cooperation of appropriate partner agencies/institutions in each country in accordance with the nature of the project and its relevance to specific country needs and priorities. This cooperation can only be effectively achieved through comprehensive consultations from the start. Thus planned activities to be funded by the PDF are focused on ensuring that adequate national level consultation is undertaken to secure support for the project, and to gather ideas and advice necessary to inform the project planning and development process.

PDF funds will be used to co-finance this region wide consultation and development process. This will consist of one regional level consultative workshop followed by national level consultations in each of the seven countries with community-based organisations, NGOs, government agencies and other relevant agencies/individuals.

The regional preparatory workshop will involve existing collaborating agencies and partners throughout the region, many of whom were involved with the precursor to this project in their capacity as members of the Southern Africa Sustainable Use Specialist Group (SASUSG). Further to this, SASUSG has established a Working Group specifically for Theatre for Africa (see Annex 1). Appropriately therefore, this preparatory meeting will be hosted jointly with SASUSG and will be organised to coincide with SASUSG's forthcoming Annual General Meeting, to be held in Botswana in mid-November 1998. Linking up with the SASUSG meeting represents a cost-effective means to consult with a wide range of non-government, government, academic and community based organisations representing a wide range of disciplines of relevance to the sustainable use of natural resources, biodiversity conservation and community development. It should be noted that whilst SASUSG is institutionally affiliated with IUCN it should not be confused with IUCN itself, particularly IUCN / ROSA. It is a voluntary, independent body that is not programmatically related, subordinate or accountable to IUCN / ROSA.

The regional preparatory workshop will focus on:

- clarification of objectives, activities and outputs for the project in line with priorities common to the region;
- exploration of potential transboundary activities;
- coordination of and communication between national level project initiatives to ensure maximum regional impact;
- providing feedback and refinement of the draft project proposal developed following the national consultation process.

A consultation process will be undertaken in each country with potential partners/collaborating institutions, including NGOs, community based organisations, national theatre / arts groups, relevant government agencies and other potentially interested groups. Initial identification of appropriate partner agencies will be undertaken in close cooperation with and advice from regional organisations and networks with which ART is already programmatically engaged, such as SASUSG, SAFCAN (Southern African Forum for Communities And NGOs) and the SADC TCU (see Annexes 1, 2 and 3).

These national consultations will focus on the following:

- preliminary discussions concerning the resurgence and adaptation of the successful play 'Guardians of Eden';
- identification, using local expertise and within the broad framework developed, of the thematic issues, geographic focus, timing, local languages etc., to inform the development of theatre performances for each country;
- development of national support networks to facilitate the building of a constituency for conservation and sustainable use of natural resources in local communities;
- identification of at least one partner organisation in each country to function as national organiser / host, and an assessment of the inputs they will require to undertake the associated activities;
- identification of other stakeholders and relevant target audiences, such as policy makers;
- complementary activities, such as other GEF financed projects, which may be ongoing in some countries. These will be identified and efforts made to collaborate with them where feasible;
- opportunities for transboundary activities;
- identification of potential strengths and weaknesses before plans are developed at a regional level.

Expected outputs and completion dates:

The anticipated outputs of this process are:

- the development of a constituency for the conservation and sustainable use of natural resources in local communities in 7 countries identified;
- consultations and briefings conducted in 7 countries;
- potential partnerships identified, reviewed and agreed;
- regional consultation and review of project concept undertaken with key stakeholders;
- project endorsement received from national GEF Focal Points;
- project proposal developed and submitted.

The final output will be the completed project proposal, to be submitted to World Bank by December 10, 1998. This is subject to the availability of the required funds in terms of this proposal being made available to enable the national consultation processes to take place in early November, culminating with the regional preparatory meeting coinciding with SASUSG's AGM in late November.

Other possible contributors/donors and amounts:

The joint project proponents, ART and ZimTrust, together with Theatre for Africa and SASUSG, will contribute to the cost of the activities under this proposal.

ART and ZimTrust will contribute the time and services of their senior management, notably the General Secretary, the Financial Manager and the ART Programme Coordinator, for the purpose of providing logistical and administrative support to facilitate the regional and national consultations and to review the draft project proposal for finalisation with special responsibility for the budget component. In monetary terms it is estimated that this ART/ZimTrust contribution will be \$2,700. In addition, ART and Theatre for Africa will both contribute the time of senior programme staff to facilitate the national and regional consultation process, which contribution is costed at \$1,960.

SASUSG will effectively contribute by allocating one full day of its forthcoming AGM to

matters related to this project, as detailed in the regional consultative workshop referred to above. The cost to SASUSG is conservatively estimated at \$4,500, where this excludes consideration of members travel costs to and from the meeting.

IUCN have no direct involvement in this initiative but it is nevertheless worth noting that when regional initiatives of this nature are undertaken, the IUCN national and regional offices provide assistance in facilitating activities upon request. If it is determined appropriate to approach them, no doubt they will do likewise with the intended activities identified here. It is not possible to provide a figure for this 'in-kind' contribution, but this assistance from IUCN to regional environmental activities is inevitably invaluable.

PART 111 – INFORMATION ON THE APPLICANT INSTITUTION

The project shall be jointly managed by Africa Resources Trust (ART) and Zimbabwe Trust (ZimTrust), closely affiliated non-profit organisations based in Zimbabwe with a strong record of jointly managed projects. ART also has a representative office in Johannesburg, South Africa. ART will coordinate all project activities with Theatre for Africa, while ZimTrust shall be responsible for financial and grant management functions, including any contractual arrangements with third parties. ART focuses on advocacy and capacity building for community sustainable use regimes, programmatically referred to as conservation based community development (CBCD), in the southern African region. ART is currently undertaking this through its participation in ongoing national and regional programs, the main ones being:

- the CAMPFIRE program in Zimbabwe, where ART is a formal member of the technical advisory and implementing consortium known as the CAMPFIRE Collaborative Group;
- the regional SADC-NRMP programme, for which ART is contracted in concert with IUCN and WWF, to provide capacity-building services to the SADC Wildlife Technical Co-ordination Unit (WTCU) including responsibilities for intra-regional technical exchanges, information and communication, policy development and research;
- the Southern African Forum for Communities And NGOs (SAFCAN), where ART is the regional secretariat for an ad hoc regional grouping of some 40 sustainable development Community Based Organisations and NGOs engaged in a capacity-building process to enhance their participation in relevant MEAs, principally the CBD and CITES.

Zimbabwe Trust, established upon Zimbabwe's Independence in 1980, is principally engaged in facilitating local level institutional development and provision of related skills training within Zimbabwe's Communal Lands, for effective and sustainable community development initiatives. Together with the Centre for Applied Social Sciences (CASS) in the University of Zimbabwe, WWF, and the Zimbabwe Government's Department of National Parks and Wildlife Management, ZimTrust was a founding member of the CAMPFIRE Collaborative Group which initiated and sponsored the CAMPFIRE Program in Zimbabwe in the mid-1980s and ZimTrust remains fully involved in supporting the expansion and consolidation of the Program.

For the purposes of this and other sustainable development programs both national and regional, ZimTrust has received and properly managed significant grant funds from several multilateral and bilateral donors including the EU, USAID, DFID(UK), Governments of the Netherlands, Germany, Norway and Sweden.

Theatre for Africa, who will be Zimtrust and ARTs primary implementing partner for this project (although not an applicant institution), has recently successfully completed activities similar to those envisaged in this project with the GEF Lake Malawi / Niassa Biodiversity project and is currently involved with the ongoing (South African) Cape Peninsula National Park Project.
