RE: ENDORSEMENT LETTER FOR PROMOTING SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT SOLUTIONS FOR EAST AFRICA –NAIROBI, KENYA COMPONENT.

The City of Nairobi is experiencing tremendous population growth at annual growth of 4%. This population growth rate is higher than the national population growth rate of 3.4% per annum. Increased population in the city inserts more pressure on transportation services and infrastructure. For instance, it is currently estimated that the average commuter distance which was 0.8km in the 1970s increased to 25km in 1998. The 2008 average commuter distance was placed at over 30-40km. The phenomenon of urban sprawl in the city continues to manifest itself in terms of rapid expansion of satellite towns. This has had diverse ramifications on public transportation system contributing to its deterioration.

The Nairobi's CBD attracts a lot of pressure on the transportation system thereby overstretching the services beyond their design carrying capacities. In addition, the annual increase in vehicular traffic has not been accompanied by commensurate increase in the capacity of city transportation network. The need to increase and the transport supply in the city is obviously not a debatable issue. Inadequacy in the road capacity, road structure and traffic management has lead to heavy congestion and traffic accidents.

Accordingly, in order to improve the situation, there have been efforts to improve the missing links and improvement of road structures/facilities and traffic management capacity is absolutely necessary. Sound investment in addressing the above challenges

has to be informed by studies and research in some of the critical components of the city transportation system. This is a course that the City Council is committed to and supports. In particular, there is especially a need for further research and investment in public transport infrastructure so as to guide ongoing efforts in this area among others and the City of Nairobi is fully committed to seeing this investment happen.

We therefore strongly support the program of work for BRT in Nairobi and fully support funding from the Global Environmental Facility (GEF) for the above-referenced program.



## Dear Madam,

On behalf of the Ministry of Transport and Communication (MOTAC) of Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia, I would like to extend my greetings. MOTAC is the responsible federal body for the expansion and provision of transport and communications infrastructure and services at equitable, reliable and in an environmentally sustainable manner in urban and rural Ethiopia.

Presently, the urban transport in Addis Ababa is facing challenges of a fast rate of population and spatial growth, high rate of growth in vehicle ownership among a small but significant minority of residents, while the majority remains captive to a poor public transport. To this effect, the Ministry and the City Administration recognize the urgent need intended for an improved public transport system for the inhabitants of Addis Ababa in an environmentally sound, socially acceptable and economical viable

manner, and hence are committed to its effect. As an initiative, the government has pursued a mass transit strategy and currently is considering two set of actions divided into two components consulting with relevant stakeholders. The first component will UNEP-GEF project, which is inline with our strategy, i.e. "Promoting Sustainable Transport Solutions for East Africa Project -Ethiopia component", while the second component constitutes the design, construction and making operational an electric light rail system and/or electric based bus rapid system that will be served from the hydro grid in Addis Ababa. The two initiatives are, therefore, complementary. In addition to this the Government effort in introducing clean fuels for vehicles where ethanol-petrol blend (E5) being put in practice at the moment depicts attempts in promoting eco-mobility and improving air quality of the city. Therefore, when the components are completed it is expected that the carbon footprint of transport sector of the City will be significantly reduced and mobility greatly enhanced.

REQUEST FOR UN GEF SUPPORT TO KAMPALA CITY COUNCIL'S BRT/ NMT PROJECTS

Kampala, the capital city of Uganda, is one of the fastest growing cities in Sub Saharan Africa. Currently the Greater Kampala Metropolitan Area (GKMA) has a population of about 2.6 million. This is equivalent to 9% of the national population and about 70% of the total urban population in Uganda. The dramatic increase in car ownership and fast urbanization coupled with a public transport service that is dominated with low capacity vehicles (paratransit), and lack of facilities for non motorised traffic have led to widespread congestion, increased road traffic accidents and environmental pollution. The Government of Uganda, and Kampala City Council (KCC) are committed to reversing this undesirable situation.

A transport strategy for Kampala has been prepared which emphasizes the introduction of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) and facilities for Non Motorised Traffic (NMT). Efforts to implement these measures are already underway, particularly the solicitation of funds to ensure that these measures are implemented sooner rather than later. To this end a feasibility study for the BRT system will be carried out in the first half of this year.

We have learnt that our BRT/ NMT efforts can qualify for UN GEF funding. The purpose of this letter is to make a formal request for financial support from the UN GEF to Kampala City's BRT and NMT projects.

We look forward to your support in this effort, and to your advice on the next steps in this regard.
