Georgian Integrated Coastal Management Project is financed by International Development Association credit and GEF grant, also by the governments of the Netherlands and Georgia. The project will continue for 6 years and is to end by December 31 2004. The aim of the project is to assist Georgia in meeting the commitments outlined in the Strategic Action Plan for the Rehabilitation and Protection of the Black Sea and the Bucharest Convention, also to implement priority actions outlined in the Georgia Biodiversity Strategy/Action Plan.

The Project consists of five components:

- 1) ICZM Institutional Capacity Building;
- 2) Establishment of Kolkheti National Park and Kobuleti Reserve;
- 3) Establishment of Coastal Environmental Monitoring and Information system;

Please find further on some contributions which Romanian Government and bilateral donors are going to make into the Black Sea environment protection activities, on the Romanian side, in the coming years.

1. *"WWTPs upgrading, rehabilitation of sewerage network, waste water pumping stations, rehabilitation of waste water discharging pipelines (repairing, length increasing, diffusion systems)".*

96 million Euro (2004-2006). 73 ISPA funds and 23 local authorities. The most important are:

- Upgrading WWTP - 41 608 000 Euro
- Rehabilitation of waste water pumping stations - 16 605 000 Euro
- Rehabilitation of sewerage network - 6 029 000 Euro
- Rehabilitation of waste water discharging pipe lines - 16 240 680 Euro

2. *"Rehabilitation and protection of coastal zone against erosion (light and heavy solutions as well as monitoring)".*

The period is 2004 - 2008 and the expenditures are about 210 millions USD.



Постановлением Правительства РФ от 08.08.01 №581 была утверждена *федеральная целевая программа «Юг России»*, в которую вошли мероприятия по строительству очистных сооружений в бассейне Черного и Азовского морей (программные проекты и мероприятия рассчитаны на период до 2006 г.).

ФЦП «Юг России» направлена на создание условий для устойчивого развития южных районов России и улучшения социально-экономической обстановки. Программа предусматривает реализацию комплекса проектов и мероприятий, направленных на улучшение использования водных ресурсов, развитие коммунального хозяйства и предотвращение аварийных и угрожающих ситуаций; особое внимание уделяется разработке и реализации комплекса природоохранных мероприятий, направленных на защиту и оздоровление водных экосистем.

В ФЦП «Юг России», координатором которой является Министерство экономического развития и торговли РФ, включено **17 природоохранных мероприятий**, в том числе строительство 13 природоохранных объектов в бассейне Черного и Азовского морей.

На 2003 г. по программе было предусмотрено финансирование в объеме 144, 4 млн. руб. (около 4,8 млн.долл. США), в том числе из федерального бюджета – 66,9 млн. руб.(ок.2,23 млн. дол.), из краевого бюджета – 27 млн. руб. (ок 0,9 млн дол.), за счет местных бюджетов – 65,5 млн. руб.(ок.2,18 млн).



(10,6 млн.долл)** в т.ч. из федерального бюджета **73,0 млн. руб.(2,45 млн.дол)**; красного и местных бюджетов – **223,8 млн. руб (7,45 млн. долл.)**, из внебюджетных источников – **20 млн.руб. (0,7 млн.дол.)**.



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Brief Description

The project in its Phase 2 will continue supporting the Black Sea regional aspects of the Black Sea Partnership for Nutrient Control. It will assist and strengthen the role of the Black Sea Commission (of the Bucharest Convention for the Protection of the Black Sea against Pollution) and ensure the provision of a suite of harmonised legal and policy instruments for tackling the problem of eutrophication, and release of certain hazardous substances, and to facilitate ecosystem recovery. An important feature of the project is its encouragement of broad stakeholder participation. This will be achieved by inter-sectoral co-ordination, the provision of small grants to local initiatives and support for public information and environmental education. The project will also enable a new suite of indicators for monitoring the effectiveness of the measures taken by the Partnership. These indicators, together with targeted scientific studies, will help to set new regional nutrient control targets within the concept of adaptive management. The PDF-B study has revealed that making a remarkable progress in the attainment of these objectives would require at least a five years of concerted action at the wider basin level. Unfortunately, owing to funding constraints, a two-phased approach had to be taken for the implementation of the overall strategy. Phasing was based on a reconsideration of the relative priorities of achieving certain targets and evaluation of the need for earlier delivery of certain project outcomes which will be essential inputs for the implementation of other activities envisaged for the 5 years integrated project. The current project will be part of the broader multi-donor Black Sea Environmental Programme and clear mechanisms will be established for donor co-ordination and for co-ordination and the sharing of objectives with the Danube and Dniro GEF Projects.



Dear Mr. Reynolds,

Thank you very much for sending us the 2nd Phase BSERP Document. The experts of the Ministry have reviewed this document and found it well prepared and in general acceptable. In our opinion, in terms of expected results, this project description is one of the best we ever dealt with. At the same time some comments and proposals, depicted below, will serve to strengthen the implementation mechanism of the Project and improve the quality of the results.

This letter is serve to inform you as well that we would be happy to provide the letter of endorsement of the Project Document for Phase 2 activities on behalf of the Ministry of Environmental Protection of Ukraine after incorporation of our comments into Project proposals.

I do hope that GEF Council will approve these proposals and we will get new opportunity and effective support for our joint efforts to improve Black Sea environment. I do hope as well that PIU under your leadership is able to find the proper way of management and allocate necessary resources to sustain PIU itsels and National BSERP Office during interim period between 1st and 2nd phases of the Project implementation.

Our comments:

1. We are glad to find that it is expected to implement Project activities involving experts and professionals mainly from the region rather than rely upon international consultants. At the same time we feel there are some contradictions between outcomes expected from some activities and mechanism of their implementation. For example, it seems to us that implementation of the item 4.1.7 (design and assist in implementation of a pilot project for Black Sea VTOPIS, Table 14) will not be possible without involvement of experts from Black Sea countries. Please reconsider.

2. In general, expected results of the Phase II are too ambitious in order to be achieved within planned period of time and available PIU staff. In this regard, we consider that national Project support structure will play exclusively important role in

facilitation of the Project activities at national level. On other hand, this infrastructure is important also for strengthening the national capacities in the field of marine environmental management and policy development, as well as for accelerating the regional cooperation, which is in line with Project objectives.

It seems that Project designers clearly understand and support this approach (items 91, 94, 96, 97, and others). Accordingly, corresponding funds have been allocated in the budget for Phase II. Regretfully, allocations for the national Project Support Structure (namly National BSERP Offices, line 1701 of table 13) can not be accepted as an adequate, especially taking into account that there are no indications in the budget about operational support costs. No funds were planned for the item 1.2.2 "Further establish and operate the Project Support Structure at national level to facilitate cooperation between the BSERP and the National Commissioners..." (Table 14). It means that inconsistency between 1st and 2nd Phases of the Project may cause losses of the achieved results because sustainability of the Project support structure at national level is still under threat of weakness of national institutional structure and lack of national funding. We believe that Project should avoid this sad option and request you to allocate relevant fund or foresee appropriate mechanism to make this support system functioning.

3. Item 4.2.3 (Table 14): funding looks insufficient.

4. Item 106: It would be relevant to include the recommendations on how to strengthen national legislation related to the ICZM into list of success criteria.

5. General remark: Time frame, in particularly, for activities scheduled for 2004, evidently is not realistic. It's possible to keep as it is, but we realize that activities will be delayed.

Please consider these comments and provide us with revised Project description and explanation.

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
